Kicking off the season is Beethoven's Emperor Concerto at the Meyerson Symphony Center, conducted by Maestro Jaap Van Zweden, the Music Director Designate of the Dallas Symphony Orchestra. In addition to the Concerto, where the piano will be played by Rudolf Buchbinder, the orchestra will perform Beethoven's 3rd Symphony, "Eroica," a piece originally dedicated to the Emperor Napoleon. Later that month, JPG will return to the Meyerson to see the complete live score of *Raiders of the Lost Ark*. Fans still came out in droves, despite increased competition from the home viewing platforms such as Netflix and HBO, due to the large number of box office behemoths that were released.
