

"Vox Populi, Vox Dei?" **Populism in Poland and** the Future of the E.U.

The European Union is considered one of the greatest achievements of our time, uniting member states into one common market under a shared set of democratic ideals that is often credited with stopping more fruitless conflict in Europe since World War 2's end. Even though it arose from centuries of thought and decades of economic policy, the E.U.'s political unity has not always been guaranteed as recent events like Brexit show. The most difficult political issues for the bloc have emerged in Eastern Europe, particularly Romania, Hungary, and Poland.

Prelude – One foggy day in April 2010, a lone jet bearing the

insignia of the Polish Air Force descended quickly towards Smolensk airport – crashing abruptly before reaching the runway, killing nearly all high ranking Polish government officials: the President, General Staff, National Bank chief, and several Polish parliament members. Investigators from both Russia and Poland determined that human error caused the crash, but the late President's twin brother and leader of Poland's right-wing Law and Justice Party (PiS), Jarosław Kaczyński, claimed it was a carefully planned political assassination. The crash came only five years before Kaczyński's PiS party secured a majority in both Poland's legislatures and the Presidency, bringing the cresting populist wave to Poland's front door...

Populism in Poland (cont'd)

Party – The Law and Justice Party traces its roots back to the Solidarność, or "Solidarity," movement that overthrew repressive one-party rule in then-Communist Poland, and today champions a right-wing, populist agenda with a focus on social conservatism and economic interventionism. PiS joined Hungarian, Slovakian, French, British, and Italian politicians in riding populist sentiments that led to PiS adopting a semi-Eurosceptic, anti-migrant, and – as the name implies – "law and order" stance on crucial policy issues.

Policy – To complete their control of the executive and legislative branches, PiS sought to rein in the judicial branch through a series of radical legislative changes starting with forcing the Polish Constitutional Court to accept five new judges appointed by a law the Court voided as unconstitutional. Immediately after the European Union began investigating Poland for violating judicial independence, PiS merged the office of justice minister and the attorney-general, giving the officeholder control of all prosecutors. In a dramatic

show of force, the European Commission – the semi-executive branch of the European Union – formally launched infringement procedures in response to the judicial reforms, which were then succeeded by another PiS initiative forcing one-third of Poland's Supreme Court judges to retire and forcing nominees through a PiS-dominated commission. The European Commission finally triggered Article 7 of the E.U.'s foundational Lisbon Treaty, which allows a member state's voting rights in the bloc to be suspended for breach of democratic principles, and opened a new legal case that is scheduled to go before the European Court of Justice.

Populism – Poland shares its Euroscepticism with Hungary's Prime Minister Viktor Orban, Italy's Giuseppe Conte, and numerous other politicians, notably Nigel Farage in Britain, who promote nationalistic and anti-integrationist policies challenging the E.U.'s economic, cultural, and political integration. The E.U., notably, is not a federal system but instead relies on the cooperation or collective bargaining of member states to enforce its rules. In uniting a range of cultures and societies under one voluntary organization, the E.U. depends on deeply-rooted European identity and transnationalism – putting one's common heritage above national identity. Because it relies on identity and voluntary rulemaking, the E.U.'s existence could

be threatened on several fronts by populism, financial crises and Eurozone instability, a large migrant influx, and potential member state exits like Brexit. The E.U. has, however, slowly created a quasi-federal structure by amalgamating various departments into three branches: the Executive under the European Commission, the Legislative under the European Parliament and Council, and the Judiciary under the European Court of Justice.

These gradual shifts from confederation towards federation in E.U. policy has ignited fears in



Photo By Wikimedia Commons member states that their identity or government will be superseded by a mega-state, and populist politicians have been quick to capitalise on those fears. If the E.U. is to survive as a pan-European entity, it will have to assuage concerns from Eurosceptics in the East that member states remain sovereign and Europhiles in the West that the Union take on a greater role in mitigating crises. While it may be considered one of the greatest successes of recent history, the European Union must evolve to stay relevant in an age of rapid change, but it must always do so with the old adage "vox

The most recent Nike advertisement, featuring Colin Kaepernick, a former 49ers NFL player, has ignited a storm of backlash. The caption of the advertisement is "Believe in something. Even if that means sacrificing everything." These words have a lot to do with Kaepernick's controversial kneeling during the national anthem. This advertisement was a calculated risk by Nike, as they hoped that the good resulting from this ad would outweigh the bad, and as marketing experts have said, it will. Tremendous backlash like this has been beneficial to companies in recent years. For example, when the Chik-fil-A owner spoke against gay marriage, even after groups boycotted the fast food service, sales went on an upward trend. Similarly, Nike's sales have also benefited from the controversial advertisement having 61 percent more merchandise sold since the controversial advertisement came

out.

For Nike, this ad is just about being loyal to the core values they want in their athletes. They have always looked for trailblazers, people who have forged their own path, and that have set themselves apart from other athletes. Some examples of this have been Bo Jackson and Michael Jordan. The most recent of these athletes just happens to be Colin Kaepernick, as he has not allowed himself to be silenced by others, and has stood up for what he believes in. This fighting spirit resonates with the young crowd and their target audience.

This advertisement has other tangible benefits too. Despite some of the talk being negative, Nike, the advertisement, and many things associated with Nike are constantly brought by people on Twitter, Instagram, and Facebook. The president has tweeted about it, and the words "Just Do It" have been some of the top ones trending on Twitter. It even comes up in casual conversation. Therefore, Nike's decision to feature Colin Kaepernick, whether a good decision or not, has everyone talking about them and their products.

Hurricane Florence

After last year's terrible hurricane season, most people thought that we were due for a break. However, this season returned with a vengeance as Hurricane Florence hit the Carolina Coast on September 14th. Hurricane Florence formed in Africa at the end of August and slowly moved across the Atlantic for weeks. On September 4th, the storm reached a Category 4 for the first time. However, this wind speed was too high to sustain and the hurricane ripped itself apart slowing itself down to a tropical storm few days later. Once again, in just three days, Florence worked itself back up to a Category 4. When Florence reached land, it slowed itself down to a Category 1 with wind speeds of about 80-90 miles per hour, previously having winds speeds above 100 miles per hour.

When it made landfall at Wrightsville Beach, Florence slowed down and only moved at a pace of 2-3 miles per hour. As a result, it dropped a lot of rain in a very

small amount of time, flooding both inland and costal cities. Some of these cities reported over 30" of rain during this period.

Less than a week after reaching land, the hurricane broke up over West Virginia. As of October 2nd, Florence has a death toll of 51 and has caused billion of dollars worth of damage. However, Florence did not travel as far north as previously predicted because it stalled out. This resulted in a lot more flooding in the locations that it hit, which damaged the cities even more.

Currently, the Federal **Emergency Management Agency** (FEMA) is trying to help with the damage, doing things such as a Rumor Control department that is trying to dispel rumors on how to help. One such rumor would include going to the beach to get sand for extra sandbags. This department is helping keep people from doing anything that could endanger their lives even more. In providing this kind of aid, FEMA has demonstrated how important an agency it is by keeping our nation safe from unstoppable natural disasters.

of the park.



The Egg Drop

This past Tuesday, September the 25th, marked a historic event: the Form VII Egg Drop. It was a day of highs and a day of lows. A day of joys and a day of sorrows. A day of -- well, you get the idea. For this physics lab, the 7th form class divides into groups of two to compete in a test of ingenuity, creativity, and skill. Each group must create two different structures in which to drop an egg from the balcony of the 2nd level of the science building. One model, called the "crumple zone," must be made of rigid materials that could break upon impact with the ground, whereas the other model must employ some sort of parachute (or another device to provide air resistance) in its descent to provide for a safe landing for the egg. There were many specifications that these models had to follow, although *some* people simply took these rules as loose suggestions.

With as many participants

as there are in a form, there is bound to be an interesting variety of models. In fact, designs ranged from the so-called "Eggcopter", which spun downwards in a whirl of fury, to an egg pinned between two dried bagels.

There was also the famous "PEPPERS." That group attached celery and bell peppers with nails and zipties, and then stuck a bell pepper on top, and another pepper inside that pepper, and then an egg inside that. Many people doubted the safety (and legality) of their structure, but by some miracle, the impact with the ground caused the peppers to explode and the egg to fly and hit the ground without shattering. When asked why he choose bell peppers as the basis for his project, Nathan Paul said, "It was all because of convenience. I really didn't want to have to make a lunch that day, so I figured if it broke I could stick it in the microwave and have an easy omlette."

Many groups developed a close attachment to and affection for the eggs they had labored so furiously to protect along with the structure itself. Unfortunately, only a few "crumple zone" projects man- on the hard concrete.

aged to protect their eggs. Groups such as my own were sorely disappointed to hear the sound of our prized eggs cracking, showing our failure to adequately protect them. Many parachute models, in contrast to the "crumple zone" models, performed remarkably well, even with the unexpected factor of gusts of wind sweeping them up. Furthermore, some of these had to survive the labyrinth of trees ready to ensnare them. Almost as many as failed in the "crumple zone" saw success as their creation battled strong gales to emerge victorious.

Finally, some free-style egg drops (not for a grade) took place. This provided the perfect opportunity for some bizarre sights, including a styrafoam head with an egg buried in its forehead. 

Cross Country is great for boosting stamina, a highly important component to any competitive sport. In the Upper School, Cross Country gets more intense. Practice is every day, after school on Monday, Wednesday, and Thursday, and early in the morning on Tuesday and Friday. The Hawks currently sit at 3-2 this season and are getting ready to take on the Casady Cyclones for the Cistercian Homecoming football game tonight. It's been quite the season of ups and downs for the Hawks thus far.

The season kicked off with the slaughter of Colleyville Covenant to the tune of 72-13, the highest number of points Cistercian has ever put up on the board. The next week, the Hawks fought hard and even had a lead

in the third quarter against rival St. Mark's, but ultimately lost 34-17. It was certainly a memorable night despite the loss, as Hawks Field was packed with fans and

This game was followed by another rivalry game, this time with the much-maligned Greenhill, the team that prevented CPS from playing in the Championship last season. Retribution was served with force, as the Hawks brutalized Greenhill 49-13, even after a rather slow start. The game got out of hand quickly with a dominant 22-0 second half, and Cistercian cruised to its second win of the young sea-

The Hawks then traveled south to take on the Austin Saints in their Homecoming game, also Cistercian's first conference game and its first step towards another championship berth. The Saints

came into the game riding high on a three-game win streak. Their Homecoming festivities were ruined, as Cistercian dominated from the start, taking a 14-0 lead into halftime, eventually cruising to another dominating 37-6 win.

Cistercian is now coming off a heartbreaking 42-35 loss to John Cooper. The Hawks came out too slow, dug too big of a hole, and ultimately weren't able to complete the comeback effort. After trimming down a 42-21 deficit to just 42-35, Cistercian missed both the opportunities it had in the closing minutes to try to tie the game. The Hawks definitely hope to see the Dragons again in the championship, who leads the team in receiving and now the team will have to work on a razor-thin margin for error in the final five games.

Tonight, we'll play Casady, a team with a 2-3 record that has struggled mightly this season. Cistercian also beat Casady very thoroughly in 2017, coming away with a 48-19 win. This is a big game, rushing yards, respectively. as a win would put the Hawks at 2-1, giving Cistercian the early inside track to the championship. The Hawks recipe for success has been our ability to deal with adver-

sity. Along with the loss of the game against St. Mark's, the Hawks lost starting quarterback Aidan Click to a season-ending torn ACL. Click finished his season with four touchdowns.

Jimmy Garda has stepped up at quarterback in a huge way, accounting for 13 touchdowns through the first four games. Garda has thrown for 394 yards, accompanied by 428 yards on the ground. Other notable contributors have been Kaosi Unini (123 yards, one touchdown), Harry Crutcher, who has accounted for 112 rushing yards and 128 receiving yards despite missing two games and Sam Clay, with 259 yards thus far.

Besides the offense, the defense has been nothing short of lockdown, holding opponents to 16.5 points per game. The defensive front has also pitched games against Colleyville Covenant and Greenhill which it held them to 0 and -40

Cistercian is off to a very successful start to its 2018 season, with the hope that a Chamionship trophy will soon be in our posses-

With a population of over 230,000, Irving is a surprisingly beautiful sister city to Dallas, which itself is on the verge of becoming one of America's prominent cities. Both are keeping up their commercial growth by continuing to excel artistically, with the Dallas Theatre Center winning the Regional Theater Tony Award in 2017 As for Irving, its sights are set on the current music industry with a 200 million-dollar complex that the

city hopes will turn it into a tourist destination: the Toyota Music Factory.

Located between Highway 114 and West Las Colinas Boulevard, the Music Factory is designed to allow people to eat din-

ner and dance the night away at a concert in one of two arenas. The smaller of the two, the Texas Lottery Plaza, is located directly next to the restaurants. This open-air venue is designed for more casual performances, with a smaller stage and underground acts. One might also want to get some food, which is where the varied restaurants and bars come in. There's Brazilian steak, Japanese cuisine, pizza, and even The Country's Best Yogurt™. There's also the Bar Louie with a Friday night DJ set, so if you've been wanting to hear someone play Cardi B for more than ten seconds, you can finally fulfill your dreams at the Toyota Music Factory.

The second entertainment space in the Factory is the multi-purpose Pavilion, to which entertainment company Live Nation has exclusive booking rights. This means that even if there is an amazing act that could fill the 8,000-seat amphitheater, if they are not in a deal with Live Nation, then that act cannot perform there. In an ideal world, this would not be the case, but it is better than not having a Pavilion at all. Anyway, a cultural experience through its this space has three modes: the previously mentioned amphitheater, the 4,000-seat indoor theater, and a 2,500-seat "intimate theater".

As for the acts there, Live Nation provides a number of noteworthy and exciting performers, including Ms. Lauryn Hill, 5 Seconds of Summer, and hip-hop collective 88Rising. The space isn't just for music, either: comedian Brian Regan will be doing a show in the Pavilion this December, and a comedy troupe from TruTV will appear in March of 2018. Overall, the Pavilion is a great mid-size venue for decently-known acts who haven't yet reached arena capacity.

The only downside is that only Live Nation acts can perform here, which stifles the artistic lineup of the Factory. Certain acts will have to pass over potentially per-

forming in Dallas if they are too small for American Airlines Center but not a part of Live Nation either.

Overall, the Toyota Music Factory is a great addition to the Irving community. It provides a clear outlet for big acts that can't yet take the American Airlines Center while also packaging it along with various diners. It gives our city a musical foundation that hopefully will become central to the community as Irving and particularly Dallas begin to emerge as important cities in both Texas and the whole nation. It also helps its sponsors, with Live Nation getting a performance center in an emerging powerhouse county and Toyota, which recently moved its American headquarters to Plano, to become important in the community where it now resides. Is it perfect? Of course not. But does it provide a new kind of musical experience to a community that has reached a point where purposeful culture is the most important addition? Indeed, it does. And it also might let me actually hear Cardi B at a party, so no matter what, it does good.
